Why does ACP have a Resolutions Process?

ACP has a Resolutions Process to ensure that all members have a say in the organization's decisions and to provide a fair and equitable process for resolving disputes.

What is a resolution?

A resolution is a formal decision made by the members of the organization. It is a statement of the organization's position on a particular issue, and it is binding on all members.

Resolutions are typically adopted at the annual general meeting, but they can also be adopted at special meetings.

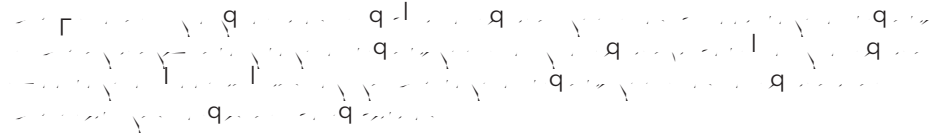

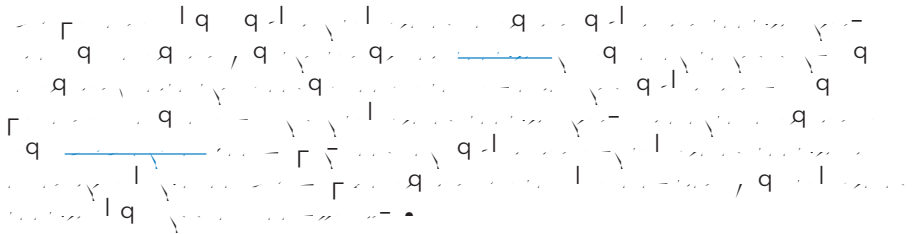
