

<u>Abstract</u>

"Playing to the measure" or "gaming the system" rather than focusing on the patient

- o Comprehensive, appropriate care is not served by an environment in which care is judged based on limited measures that do not account for multiple complex chronic conditions, counseling and communications needs of patients, patient experience, continuity of care and other factors that are not as readily quantifiable as, for example, a lab result. All measures must sustain and enhance appropriate patient care and the patient-physician relationship.<sup>19</sup>
